Acupuncture is recognized by the National Institute of Health (NIH) and the World Health Organization (WHO) to be effective in the treatment of many acute and chronic health issues.

Research has shown many scientific theories on mechanism of acupuncture, some of them are:

- Neurotransmitter Theory: Acupuncture
 affects the higher brain areas, stimulating the
 secretion of beta-endorphins and enkephalins
 which influence the immune and other systems
 in the body. 1,2
- Autonomic Nervous System Theory:
 Acupuncture stimulates the release of
 norepinephrine and several types of opioids
 normalizing the autonomic nervous system,
 and reducing pain. ³
- Gate Control Theory: Acupuncture activates non-nociceptive receptors that inhibit the transmission of signals in the dorsal horn, decreasing the painful stimuli. ⁴
- Vascular-interstitial Theory: Acupuncture
 manipulates the electrical system of the body
 enhancing the closed circuit transport between
 the body tissues. This facilitates healing by
 allowing the transfer of material and electrical
 energy between normal and injured tissues. ^{5,6}
- Blood Chemistry: Acupuncture affects
 the blood concentrations suggesting that
 acupuncture can raise and diminish the
 peripheral blood components regulating the
 body toward homeostasis. 5
